


Creating career exposure for students in construction and the skilled trades



Connect with professionals

How to connect with a construction and skilled trade professional:

- → Contact local chambers of commerce to connect with companies in your area.
- → Reach out to local labor unions to connect with members and training providers.

Develop activities

Develop activities that are easy for educators AND construction and skilled trades professionals to accomplish, such as:

- → guest speakers (in-person or via video chat),
- virtual job-shadowing,
- video tour of job site,
- → guest instructor for the day, and more.



More information about virtual job shadowing and virtual job site tours:

- → These can be as short as 5-15 minutes or up to an hour and should include an introduction/overview of the job(s) and/or the construction site.
- → The videos do not need to be professionally made and can even be recorded on a cell phone or a laptop. It is more important that students see the passion for the work than if the videos look professional.
