

CUMMINS-PHIPPS GRILL HOUSE

13600 PIONEER TRAIL

This historic home was built in 1879-1880 by John (JR) and Mattie Cummins. The original property was purchased in 1856 and spanned 280 acres from the Minnesota River to Staring Lake. JR kept a horticultural journal throughout the 60 years that they lived here and his horticultural influence was highly respected as he experimented with apple trees, nuts, flowers and fruits.

In 1908, JR Cummins sold his farm to Edwin & Harriet Phipps. Phipps purchased additional acreage bringing the total to 385 acres. Edwin Phipps was known as "The Asparagus King of Hennepin County."

Harriet Phipps purchased peony plants from the Minneapolis Farmers Market around 1920. Her large peony garden on the east side of the house is over 100 years old and still enjoyed today! It is an important feature of this site and is protected.

Mildred Phipps (daughter of Edwin & Harriet Phipps) married Martin "Pappy" Grill in 1934 and purchased the farm. Pappy Martin Grill was Mildred's schoolmate and was a hired man on the farm.

In 1943, Pappy Grill sold the land (and most of the farm) to the American Aviation Corp. naming it Flying Cloud Airport. It was later bought by the Metropolitan Airports Commission (MAC) in 1948.

Pappy passed away in 1975. Mildred sold the farm to the City of Eden Prairie in 1976. The Cummins-Phipps-Grill House was placed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1982.

PF! CHALLENGE:

Read the outdoor garden kiosk to find out how many peony plants Harriet Phipps had planted over 100 years ago!



THE RILEY-JACQUES FARMSTEAD & DORENKEMPER HOUSE



9100 RILEY LAKE RD

The Riley-Jacques Farmstead was established by Frank Riley in 1855. The City of Eden Prairie purchased the land in 1990 to expand the park along the east side of Riley Lake.

The house, garage and barn are all part of the original farm. Today, the renovated barn is used for public events and is also available to rent for private functions.

PF! CHALLENGE:

Locate the "From Settlers to Suburbs" sign near the parking lot to learn what kind of farms settlers like the Warner family started establishing in the 1850s.



9090 RILEY LAKE RD

The Dorenkemper House is one of the last remaining log-built homes in Eden Prairie. Built in the 1860s and originally located along Pioneer Trail at Settler's Ridge, it was moved to the Riley-Jacque Farmstead in 2002 to save it from demolition. The hewn log construction makes the house unique and historically significant. The house has been restored and is used for educational and interpretive purposes. Be sure to check out the civil-war style fence between the house and the lake, which was an Eagle Scout project by one of our local Boy Scouts.

PF! CHALLENGE:

Read the sign in front of the house to determine the year Elizabeth Dorn Richard gave birth to daughter Irene in this home.

THE CONSOLIDATED SCHOOL

8100 SCHOOL RD

Built in the early 1920s, this Grand Mission-style building first opened its doors to students in March 1924, with the first senior class graduating in 1929. The school was also an important cultural hub and community building, providing space for movies, voting, weddings and clothes ironing - the school was one of the first buildings to have electricity in Eden Prairie.

Today it houses the Eden Prairie Schools ISD 272 administrative offices. The building is also home to the district's Historic Gym, which was a state of the art facility at the time it was built as there were no supportive pillars in the middle of the court! This gym is still enjoyed daily by Little Eagles Early Childhood & Preschool participants.

PF! CHALLENGE:

How many historical site markers are located on the south side of the building (near doors 4 & 5)?



PLEASANT HILL CEMETERY

12390 PIONEER TRL

Pleasant Hill Cemetery was formed in 1885 on Pioneer Trail. The Presbyterian Church of Eden Prairie once was right in front of the Cemetery; it is hard to imagine as Pioneer Trail has been widened. Early Presbyterians had taken their oxen carts all the way to the Bloomington Church on Penn and Old Shakopee road, and used the old cemetery for burial on Lyndale and 104th Street. Jacob Wolf purchased this beautiful location overlooking wide valley to the north with Mill Creek at the base of the hill, and Neill Lake in the distance. Loved ones were moved from the Bloomington Cemetery to Pleasant Hill.

The Anderson Clan (large Scotch-Irish family), arrived in Eden Prairie in the 1850's. Elizabeth brought five sons, and five daughters with her. Mary Jane Hill Anderson married Robert, Elizabeth's son. Mary Jane wrote in her Autobiography "Here in our cabin were our happiest days. We had a home of our very own; we were young and hopeful; and with our little family and life before us, and always work to do and the strength to do it, what more could we ask?"

P.F! CHALLENGE: Notice the large number of Andersons buried in this cemetery. Locate Elizabeth Anderson's large tombstone (near the road on the south side of the cemetery), born in 1792. What year did she die?



EDEN PRAIRIE CEMETERY

8810 EDEN PRAIRIE RD

Monroe Barker was a child-aged Civil War soldier who lost an eye in the conflict. Conflicting census information says he was born in Tennessee, Louisiana or Kentucky around 1852.

He was one of the first black residents of Eden Prairie. Monroe, also known as "Mun," was listed as a farm laborer and lodger in Eden Prairie Census rolls and worked at Miller's General Store, a community cornerstone, until his death at 90 in 1942.

He's believed to have arrived in Eden Prairie around 1870 – the same time as emancipated slave Joseph Graham, who is also buried here. Neither man had children, but before Monroe died, he bought a granite tombstone and a plot in the Eden Prairie Cemetery. In a 2018 Star Tribune Article about Joseph Graham by Curt Brown, "Freed Slave Now Has a Place in Eden Prairie History," Eden Prairie Historical Society President Katherine Case is quoted as saying, "I think it's important to know that [Graham and Barker] were loved, appreciated and accepted here then...They were farmers, laborers. They did make Eden Prairie what it was at that time."

PF! CHALLENGE: Find Monroe Barker's tombstone near the bottom of the hill. He is located near a family he was close to. What is the name on the family tombstone just to the left of his?



SMITH-DOUGLAS-MORE HOUSE

8107 EDEN PRAIRIE RD

Lured by the rich farmlands, Sheldon and Mary Smith came from New York as a young married couple ages 21 and 23 years old.

They were among the early settlers in Eden Prairie. Their first home was a cabin close to Round Lake. In 1877 they built the Queen Ann-Style home in the center of town which included a railroad depot, creamery, grain elevator, pickle factory and Miller's General Store. Their young daughters Amie and Etta, helped with the boarders that lived upstairs, and took care of the farm and kitchen garden. Both Sheldon and daughter Amie worked at the Depot as telegraphers. Amie attended school in Minneapolis. Etta died at 16 from TB. Amie married David Frank Douglas and their son Sheldon Douglas carried on the farm until 1948. Sheldon attended college in Pennsylvania. He later served as Chair of the Eden Prairie school board.

The house was sold to Earl and Helen More in 1952. The More's added electricity and beautiful plants around the homestead. They were careful to respect the integrity of the home, changing only what needed to be done. Beautiful hostas, peonies, and lilacs were planted on the property. The home was purchased by the city

from the More's in 1982, and they had life time estate until Earl's death in 1999. In 2001 the city restored and added a kitchen to renovate the home for commercial use, and it has been operating as a coffee shop since 2002.

Eden Prairie resident Ann Schuster and her family opened an independent coffee shop in October 2006 in this historic home. They named it Smith Coffee & Cafe to honor Sheldon and Mary Smith. The Schuster family has lived in Eden Prairie since 1985 and is grateful to continue welcoming guests to this beautiful historic property.

PF! CHALLENGE: Find the "stained glass windows" in the parlor. Who created this beautiful work of art? Or take a photo in front of the gazebo with your favorite drink.



RICHARD T. ANDERSON CONSERVATION AREA

18700 FLYING CLOUD DR

Richard T. Anderson Conservation Area provides breathtaking views of the Minnesota River Valley. This site has been settled since time immemorial, where Dakota people have fished, hunted, and harvested food; built houses, made tools, and prepared meals; raised families and buried those who passed on. Artifacts demonstrate great age, recent history, and everything in between. The people who lived at this site were not alone. Networks of indigenous nations shared goods, languages, and beliefs as they traveled along the Minnesota River valley and far beyond. Objects found here demonstrate those interconnections and eras.
